God Sticks With Us

In his book “A Long Obedience in the Same Direction,” Eugene Peterson comments on Psalm 129 in a chapter on Perseverance. He paraphrases the first part of the psalm in this way:

*“They’ve kicked me around ever since I was young”
—this is how Israel tells it—
“They’ve kicked me around ever since I was young,
but they never could keep me down.
Their plowmen plowed long furrows
up and down my back;
But GOD wouldn’t put up with it,
GOD sticks with us...”*

Our readings for Lent don’t include Psalm 129, but they might. Interestingly, it doesn’t come up during Easter either. And that one line (but they never could keep me down) sounds a lot to me like the common wisdom expressed in the phrase, “You can’t keep a good man down.” It’s surely an apt Easter sentiment.

It makes me wonder whether that saying has its roots in ancient psalmody. Although I doubt it; the more common translation reads: “they have not prevailed against me.” That just doesn’t have the same ring to it.

And yet the affirmation is perfect for this late Lent time that anticipates the Good News of Easter. They never could keep Jesus down. They attacked him in Nazareth and tried to throw him from the brow of the hill; and he walked through them unscathed. They attacked him in public for his troublesome teachings, and he was able to turn their words back upon them. They misunderstood him. They argued with him. They considered him dangerous. And in the end, they organized against him, saw to his betrayal and beating and humiliation. And finally—they thought—they eliminated him, torturing him to death on a cross.

Unless, of course, you take those words of the hymn “Ah, Holy Jesus” to heart:

“I it was denied thee; I crucified thee.”

We all had a hand in trying to keep this ultimately good man down.

And still, God wouldn't put up with it. And still, God sticks with us. Because the one we tried to keep down rose again. And the God who made that new life possible makes new life available also to us.

At Easter, we remember this incredibly excellent news. The resurrection is God's resounding word with which all the heavens resound. God wouldn't put up with trying to keep Jesus or us down. Our God is the one who sticks with us, no matter what.

Lean On Me

During my college years, I went on several Habitat for Humanity break trips. I worked on houses in Virginia, South Carolina and Texas. After spending this spring break with LCM students, I can add Florida to the list! We took a van of nine students, including St. Thomas' Andrew Eichmiller, all the way to Orlando, Florida.

We spent three days working on a house for a young couple and their two children. Seeing the students take ownership of the work, conquering their fears of heights and power tools, and coming together as a group was amazing. This was a truly amazing group of young adults who served and loved out of their hearts.

Each evening we spent in the Habitat dormitory, we had a time of singing, reflection, and devotion. I would like to share some of Wednesday's evening with you.

From Exodus 17:8-13

While the people of Israel were still at Rephidim, the warriors of Amalek attacked them. Moses commanded Joshua, "Choose some men to go out and fight the army of Amalek for us. Tomorrow, I will stand at the top of the hill, holding the staff of God in my hand." So Joshua did what Moses had commanded and fought the army of Amalek. Meanwhile, Moses, Aaron, and Hur climbed to the top of a nearby hill. As long as Moses held up the staff in his hand, the Israelites had the advantage. But whenever he dropped his hand, the Amalekites gained the advantage. Moses' arms soon became so tired he could no longer hold them up. So Aaron and Hur found a stone for him to sit on. Then they stood on each side of Moses, holding up his hands. So his hands held steady until sunset. As a result, Joshua overwhelmed the army of Amalek in battle.

After reading the Scripture together, we had a great discussion about how we saw ourselves in this story. From task to task and moment to moment, we were able to see ourselves in all of these roles. One minute, I would be encouraging a student to try to get a pesky screw in one more time. The next, I needed help to stabilize a piece of siding. Then together with a student, we would cheer on the roof team! One student even said she felt like Joshua, out working on the front lines, follow God's orders to serve!

I ask you the same question. Are you Moses in need of support from families and loved ones? Or are you Aaron, giving support? Or maybe you are connecting in a caregiving team like Aaron and Hur together? Most importantly, remember that no matter where you see yourself in this story, God is present with you, sustaining you in daily life. We all need help from God and from one another in order to make it through. We all need somebody to lean on.

It requires many hours of preparation and the help of so many volunteers. So I wanted to take some time to inform you of what is going on with this year's Easter Brunch.

We have a lovely sign-up board for donations in the Narthex that the youth made at our kick-off to Lent, the Pancake Dinner. It is a big board with many donation spots open, so please take a look at it when you're at St. Thomas. We all have many gifts and ways we could help; there are spots to donate food, equipment, or your time. If you sign up to donate a quiche we do need that delivered fully cooked on Easter morning by 9am. 
Juan Carlos Zamudio Rodriguez, Adult Choir Director

Special Meeting of the Congregation

For the second year in a row our congregation was presented with the very unusual problem of additional income. On Sunday, March 9 that was the issue at hand for St. Thomas congregation. Due to additional income and being frugal with our budget, the church ended 2013 with a \$18,683. surplus. With thanksgiving to God, all of the money was divided. The final approved allocation of the 2013 Budget Surplus is:

\$2000 out to MCUM

\$2000 out to St. Vincent dePaul

\$2000 out to the Interfaith Winter Shelter

\$2000 out to the IK Synod as benevolence

And the rest is internal:

\$2000 into pastor's discretionary fund

\$3000 into the capital repair fund

\$2200 for nursery staffing and

\$3483 to pay down our letter of credit



Renewable Energy Credits

We have received our first SREC check. This is the amount we made by selling our Renewable Energy Credits through Sol Systems of Ohio. The check reflects the sale of our solar power generated last year. It's \$946.25 and a larger amount than was expected.

This check and all SREC funds will be placed into a restricted fund account, so that we can track this income. The intention is to periodically write a check from this restricted account to help pay off the loan related to the costs of the solar array installation. Once the loan is paid off we will decide how to designate future SREC funds.
