## *Welcome Back, Colleen*

At their meeting on July 13, 2014, the Congregational Council voted to hire Colleen Montgomery, our Pastoral Intern for the past year, to serve as our new Minister of Youth and Christian Nurture. Colleen will begin officially in that position on August 18.

The Council is also working to extend a call to the ordained ministry of the ELCA to Colleen. In June, Rev. Rudy Mueller, Assistant to the Bishop of the Indiana-Kentucky Synod, met with the Council to explain the details of the call process. At their July meeting, council members completed the first official step in that process— the "Ministry Site Profile," an extensive document that provides demographic, congregational, and ministry information to candidates for call.

We anticipate that the process that serves to authorize candidates for calls will be completed for Colleen in October. At that time, the Council will be able to move forward with the required candidate interview and make a recommendation to the congregation.

It is our intention to have the campaign wrapped up by Sunday, November 9<sup>th</sup>. Much will happen between now and the beginning of November. The congregation will be given regular updates, and communication throughout the campaign will be a priority. Questions regarding the campaign, and any of the suggested projects that may be funded, are encouraged and welcomed. It is vitally important to the Capital Campaign Committee, and the leadership of the congregation, that the entire process be deliberate and transparent. The other members of the Capital Campaign Committee are, Dawn Bakken, John Bush, Pastor Lyle McKee, Colleen Montgomery. Please feel free to approach any of us should you have any questions.

On Sunday, September 21<sup>st</sup>, our architect, Entheos, will have a presentation on the proposed building project. We will have updated drawings and additional details to share.

Our congregation, and the members of our congregation, have been blessed with many gifts and many talents. We strive to share those gifts and talents for the benefit of those in need and for the glory of God. During the next few months, I would ask that you prayerfully consider how you might share those gifts and talents as part of this process.

## *ICC Grant*

The congregation was recently informed by the Indianapolis Center for Congregations that we were selected to receive a \$15,000 grant. This is a "Resource Grant," similar to the one we received a few years ago. Since it requires a match, a portion of capital campaign funds will be used for matching funds.

The grant will assist us in paying for our consultants at Kirby-Smith (for our capital campaign) and Entheos Architects (for Phase Two planning and construction documents).

Many thanks to our Congregation Council for their support of the effort to receive these new funds.

The architect for our congregational building plans will lead information sessions on Sunday, September 21. These sessions will follow both services, and are slated for the Education Hour (9:45 – 10:45 a.m.) and after late worship (12:30 – 1:30 p.m.).

Kevin Stuckwisch, who has worked with us on planning both Phase One (completed in 2007) and now Phase Two (tentatively scheduled for next year) will make the presentations. Kevin will present the details of what is planned, which will include renderings of what the renovations will look like should we decide to move forward following our capital campaign. We have asked for full drawings of the new kitchen, the new drive-up and drop-off entrance, and both exterior and interior views of the expanded heritage Hall. There will be time for questions.

# *Reflections on a Day of Learning & Service*

By the Confirmation Class

We learned about the story of Daniel. We learned how his story is one of two books in the Bible that uses the concept of apocalyptic literature, which is full of metaphor from the past and dreams. We learned how Daniel got away with not eating the royal rations and eating vegetables instead. Then we learned how Daniel's friends lived through King Nebuchadnezzar's fire. Daniel also survived a night in the lions' pit after being punished for praying. We learned a lot and we are we happy we had this class.

A Day at MCUM... On July 19, 2014 a few volunteers from the 2014 Confirmation Class spent an afternoon at Monroe Country United Ministries. MCUM is a non-profit organization which helps people with food, day care, and financially. While we were there, Katcha, Katie, Hannah, Madelyn, Mitchell, Joel, and Andrew did many tasks such as stocking shelves, preparing bags of food, putting bags away, and labeling and storing boxes. The helper there, Cliff, was very friendly. He gave up his Saturday to come and help. Even though it may not seem like it, the confirmation class helped a lot of families. MCUM helps 90 families a month. At the end of the day, the class said it gave them a warm, fuzzy feeling knowing that they helped families in their community that much.



## *Sunday Church School Kick-Off!*

Students and families are invited to celebrate the beginning of another year of Sunday Church School at St. Thomas! There will be music, snacks, introduction to teachers, curriculum and classrooms, and a special focus on our Sister Parish, the Santo Domingo de Guzman Parish in Chichipate, Guatemala. This is the first official and full day of Sunday Church School for the 2014-2015 year. The offerings are below.

*If you are interested in teaching a children's class, being a substitute, or leading an Adult Forum please contact Colleen Montgomery.*

**Godly Play** – This class is for toddlers (preschool and kindergarten) and teaches children an expressive language to help them explore and strengthen their innate sense of the presence of God. Story-telling and use of manipulatives are central parts of the learning experience.

**Elementary School Students** - This year St. Thomas will have three classes for this age group: 1<sup>st</sup>-3<sup>rd</sup> graders, 4<sup>th</sup> graders, and 5<sup>th</sup>-6<sup>th</sup> graders.

**Confirmation** – Students in the 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade will meet weekly to learn about the Bible and the Lutheran faith. The basic text is Martin Luther's "Small Catechism" which covers five fundamental symbols of our faith: The Ten Commandments, The Apostles' Creed, The Lord's Prayer, Baptism, and Holy Communion. The class will be taught jointly by Pr. Lyle and Colleen.

**High School** – The high school class will continue with the animate series. This year tackling Bible. Regular meetings will begin in November, but high school students are invited to the Kick Off and to be part of discussions for the future youth room.

**Adult Learning Opportunities** – There are several ways for adults to participate in Christian Nurture on Sunday mornings. Check the Weekly Announcements for each week's offerings.

Where: First Presbyterian Church, 221 E. 6<sup>th</sup> Street



Below a press release that the communities of June 30 Se'Chaj, Maya Q'eqchi Farmers' Association, Se'Tal, Hot Water Lote 9, Community of April 13, Lote 8, The Clouds, La Ceiba, El Zapatillo, and all communities of El Estor, Izabal presented recently to the public in Guatemala city. [Please take the time to read](#) Pedro and Juan Tut were selected as representatives from Chichipate and were present at the press conference that was held July 15-17th of last week.

**Communities: June 30 Se'Chaj, Maya Q'eqchi Farmers' Association, Se'Tal, Hot Water Lote 9, Community of April 13, Lote 8, The Clouds, La Ceiba, El Zapatillo, and all communities of El Estor, Izabal.**

Before the national and international public, we expose and denounce that the territory of the Q'eqchi people of El Estor have been fighting without rest since the year of 1960 until today, to bring value to our land, provide a healthy living place, work, feed our family, and strengthen our culture and identity. Thursday, July 10, 2014, the Civil National Police, the security guards of the Guatemalan Nickel Company -CGN-, and group leaders contracted by this company, acted contra the Community June 30<sup>th</sup> Se'Chaj in a series of illegalities.

1. Judge Sandra Yaneth Mendez Najera authorized the eviction but never notified the community.
2. Without presenting the eviction notice, the police began shooting tear gas at women and children from the community of June 30 Se'Chaj.
3. The results of this violent action are 3 wounded youth, who cannot be named due to fear of reprisal. Also, various houses were burned.
4. 15 students were in a school building during the eviction and where exposed to tear gas.

For these reasons we publicly denounce Judge Sandra Yaneth Mendez, who has always been in favor of the company CGN. This is the third time that she has acted contra the communities Q'eqchi, which makes us think she is partial and in favor of the Guatemalan Nickel Company. The first eviction attempt of Lote 8, Lote 9, and Setal, company guards were accompanied by hit men who were contracted by the company (which have been identified by the communities). This parallel group tried to massacre the families in the community of Se'tal, June 30th of 2012.

We also hold responsible the government of Otto Perez Molina, the governor of the state of Izabal, and the Guatemalan Nickel Company (CGN) for a violent eviction realized the 10th of July, 2014. This company believes they can kick us off our land at whatever cost, acting many times with the support of governmental institutions. May 30, 2014 President Perez Molina authorized and participated in the inauguration of a new phase of mining exploration by this company. The imposition of this is against the will of the communities affected, in which they never consulted the community as outlined in the Peace Accords, 1969.

In light of these facts, the communities Q'eqchi implore the Attorney General to cease the evictions contra the communities and that they not defend the interests of the Guatemalan Nickel Company that is violating the rights of thousands of Q'eqchi families. We also implore that the demands for the legalization of land rights be acknowledged for the Q'eqchi communities of the municipality of El Estor, Izabal.

We implore the Justice Department to investigate the parallel of security bodies of CGN that participated in the violent eviction on July 10, 2014 and the armed attack against families from the community of Se'tal on June 30, 2012.

We implore the judges that respect the process of dialog and negotiation, that they legalize land titles and not emit eviction orders whenever they feel so or give value to the information that CGN gives them and other businesses. We ask for impartiality in their sentencing.

We implore the Justice Department's human rights section, the International Commission Against Impunity in Guatemala (CICIG), the High Commission of Human Rights of the United Nations, that they investigate the acts of Judge Sarah Yaneth Mendez. We consider her judicial acts (the violent eviction) illegal.

May the human rights section of the Justice Department provide a objective report of the violent eviction that recently occurred July 10, 2014 against the community of June 30 Se'Chaj and that they form a permanent committee to verify the constant violation of our rights by CGN.

We ask that the population of El Estor to organize against the injustices that we are living. We do not permit CGN to continue abusing our rights. For our lives and the lives of our children we defend the little land that we have left.

We consider the solution to this problem generated by CGN to be the Guatemalan government to make us of its sovereignty and rescue its dignity by canceling the licenses of exploration that were given to the said company.

**You cannot buy or sell Mother Earth, you recover and defend it!**
